Traditionally doing the laundry was considered to be ownengs worko. In years past, women have spent a lot of time communicating over the clothesline, confiding in each other and seeking support. In 1990, a womengs group in Massachusetts wanted to create a statement drawing attention to the problem of violence against women. The idea was to have survivors and their friends and family document their experiences on a t-shirt that would be hung up on display. River House is using paper t-shirts.

Each personos experience is different and thatos why it isnot only the survivor who creates the shirt. Family and friends also have their own unique experiences.

The t-shirts create a powerful statement, and they help the survivors to understand that they are not alone and most of all creating a t-shirt promotes healing.

The shirts will be displayed at events such as the õHigh Teaö and local agencies in the four county service area for viewing.

ALERT: While the economy struggles and Washington injects money into companies to starve off bankruptcy, River House carries on as usual. Finances are tight with us, however, we continue to fulfill our mission with the funds we receive from federal grants, corporate grants, private donations and fund raising activities.

The economic stimulus package that was recently passed by congress may add additional funds to our bottom line which would enable us to continue current programs and expand our outreach efforts. One Woman's Story

The following story was written and submitted by a River House client. The name has been withheld for confidentiality purposes.



I have come to realize everything we as people experience, happens for a reason.

I stayed at River House for the complete 90 days you could stay. Honestly, going to River House was the best thing I could have ever done.

Since I was 16 years old, I have been bouncing from place to place. Then I became pregnant at 19. I was in an abusive relationship when the guy found out and thought it was his. I stayed for a while thinking it was best for the baby. After I came to River House I found out that I was further along than I thought, so I was completely relieved knowing it wasnøt his.

All of the advocates at River House helped me so much and are still there for me if I need them. Being at River House helped me to become independent and move into my own apartment. So now, thanks to the help of River House, I have some stability for me and my baby.

Something I learned was that in order to move forward you must be able to let go. My life has been far from easy, but I realize that everyone has their own struggles and that there is someone who has it worse off than me.

Mercy Ministry Project Grant Awarded

Rural Counseling and Advocacy Services



Who of us is not talking about the impact of gas prices on our day to day living? For a moment, imagine you are in an abusive relationship and need to talk to someone. The closest domestic violence service provider is some 60 miles away. Persons in these situations call River

House, Inc. daily asking for support and counseling.

River House, Inc. received a Mercy Ministry Project Grant for Rural Counseling and Advocacy Services. The grant is made available through the Sisters of Mercy, Regional Community of Detroit. This is the fourth such that River House successfully received from the Sisters of Mercy. Each grant project has further enhanced services and the shelter facility.

The new grant offers River House a continuing means to serve hard to reach clients in the four counties of Crawford, Ogemaw, Oscoda and Roscommon. Each week a River House Advocate is in the three outlying counties for individual counseling and Healthy Relationship Groups. In 2006-2007, 551 outreach clients sought either counseling or group services. In addition to providing these outreach services, educational presen-




tations will be offered to alert the community of local domestic and sexual violence resources.

Denim Days to Support the fight against Sexual Assault

Several employers will have their staff participate in denim days as an awareness activity during Sexual Assault Awareness Month in April.

Area agencies will have their staff donate to



River House to wear denims at the office for a day.

Denim Days began in Italy in 1992. An 18 year old girl was picked up by her 45-year old driving instructor for her very first lesson. He took her to an isolated road, pulled her out of the car and forcefully raped her. Threatened with death if she told anyone, he made her drive the car home. Later that night she told her parents and they

helped her to press charges. The perpetrator was arrested and prosecuted. He was convicted of rape and sentenced to jail.

He appealed the sentence and the case made it all the way to the Supreme Court. Within a matter of days the case was overturned and the perpetrator released. In a statement by the Chief Judge, he argued obecause the victim wore very tight jeans, she had to help him removed them, and by removing the jeans it was no longer rape but consensual sex.ö

Enraged by the verdict, within a matter of hours the women in the Italian parliament launched into immediate action and protested by wearing jeans to work. This action motivated the California Senate to do the same and spread to the Executive Director of Peace over Violence and õDenim Dayö was born.
